

### Speaking up, thinking deeply: oracy at Woldgate

We're rewriting our curriculum to place oracy at the heart of learning. Working in partnership with Voice 21, a national organisation dedicated to improving pupils' speaking skills, we are embedding opportunities for pupils to discuss, debate and develop their ideas in pairs and groups before committing them to paper. This approach builds confidence and strengthens critical thinking and writing fluency.

## Beyond the curriculum: cutaway tasks for highattaining pupils

To stretch and challenge our most able learners, we've introduced cutaway tasks—a strategy designed to encourage pupils to think beyond the curriculum. These tasks offer opportunities for deeper analysis, independent thinking, and creative exploration, helping pupils to develop the kind of intellectual curiosity that leads to exceptional outcomes.



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# Part of the Family

#### **Enrichment in action**

We have mapped out the department's enrichment provision to ensure that every year group takes part in at least one trip every year.

Mrs Edgar is currently planning a Year 8 visit to the Ripon Workhouse Museum to support pupils' exploration of social class in literature. This immersive experience will help pupils connect historical realities with the texts they study, enriching their understanding and sparking thoughtful discussion. ## KS4 writing: building strong **foundations**

At Key Stage 4, we're refining our approach to essay writing. Pupils are being supported through clear modelling of successful responses and given regular opportunities for extended writing. This helps them build stamina, structure, and sophistication in their written work—skills essential for success in GCSE English Language and Literature.

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### **Inclusive learning**

This year, we the school has provided capacity for teachers to deliver 1:1 and small-group intervention to pupils who struggle to access lessons. Ms Miller, our SEN Lead for English, has developed targeted resources and delivered training to teachers that are used to.

The collaboration between the English department and the SEN team means that pupils with additional needs are supported with care, expertise, and consistency.





### A department of readers

Mrs Wellock has led a departmental vocabulary and reading strategy that is transforming how pupils engage with texts. Through paired and reciprocal reading, pupils are introduced to new information in ways that prioritise storytelling—because our brains are wired to remember stories. Pupils are reading more, reading independently, and building a rich vocabulary that supports both comprehension and expression.

It's an exciting time to be part of the English department. As we look forward to the move to the new build, we cannot wait to develop our approaches further and ensure that every lesson requires to think deeply and communicate confidently.

#### Act 1, Scene 1 - The Witches' Opening

#### Core knowledge

- The witches reflect early modern beliefs about the supernatural.
- "weltd" doesn't mean 'strange". It comes from DE 'wierd', meaning to control tate.
- King James I was obsessed with witchcraft (he wrote <u>Doernonciagie</u> in 1997 and presided over real witch trials).
- Witches were feared and seen as agents of the Devil who disrupted the natural order.
- The opening scene's brevity and stormy setting are intentionally unsettling to grab the audience's attention.
- The witches serve as a Greek-style charus and are immediately coded as evil through language and weather.
- The witches embody unnotural forces and foreshadow events.
- "Fair is foul, and foul is fair" sets up the motif of deceptive appearances.
- The storm signals political and moral chaos.
- While Macbeth is not present, he is named, building anticipation. The witches' interest in him sets the plot in motion and positions him as the focus of dark force

This lesson should focus on analysing quotations, using the rainbow analysis method.

#### Things to reinforce:

- A quotation can be a single word = model how to choose the most effective quotation to represent the witches
- Develop the chain by asking pupils to consider what the quotation makes them think of. Reinforce that this must be within the context of the play. For example, thunder has many different connotations, what does it mean within the play?

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


