The highlight of the academic year so far (aside from the new kitchen) has been our enrichment opportunities for KS4.

We were treated to a Sri Lankan curry, Taco's and a bean-to-bar brownie, alongside talks from vendors which allowed us to flex our sensory analysis skills as well as deepen our understanding on food choice.

It was amazing to see a skilled chef at work and the group grasped the opportunity to ask several questions throughout.

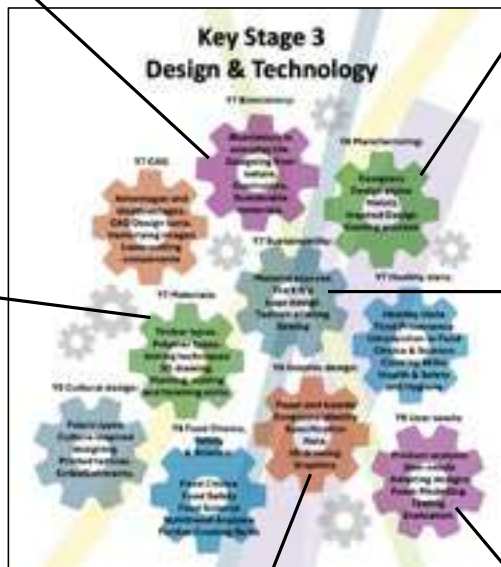


Key Stage 3 Design & Technology

Key Stage 4 Design & Technology



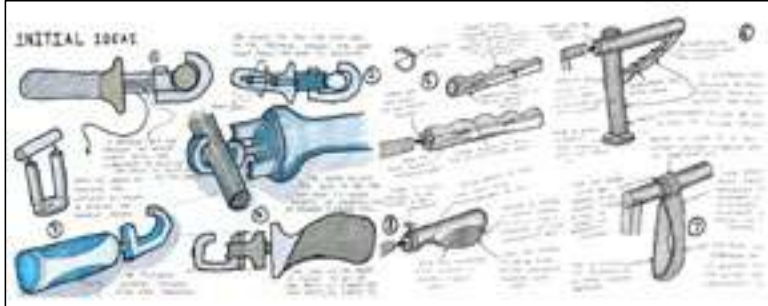
As pupils progress to Key Stage 4, they will develop a more independent style and are able to select their own materials and processes.

Below are examples of Key Stage 4 work. Polly has designed a lovely, self-assemble car for children, aiming to develop motor skills. She used plywood and vacuum-formed high impact polystyrene over her pieces to create a lovely casing. The car was held together using dowels, living hinge strips and magnets.

Other examples of creative KS4 outcomes are below. Some exceptional ideas!

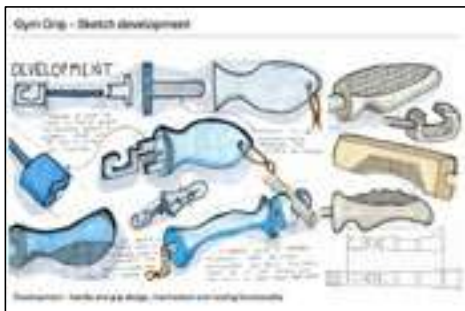


Key Stage 5 Design & Technology



At A-level, students write their own design brief and work with a live client.

Tom had a keen interest in sport and therefore focused his project on gym equipment, more specifically ergonomic grips to use at the gym.



The development process for Tom included lots of trials, models and testing to select the best material, shape, finish and mechanism.

Tom is now studying design at University.

Alicia is a talented seamstress, and she chose to design and make a corset for a specific client's need for her final project.

She used Angelina fibres and a range of fabrics to create a beautifully constructed corset.



Corset refinements using CAD.



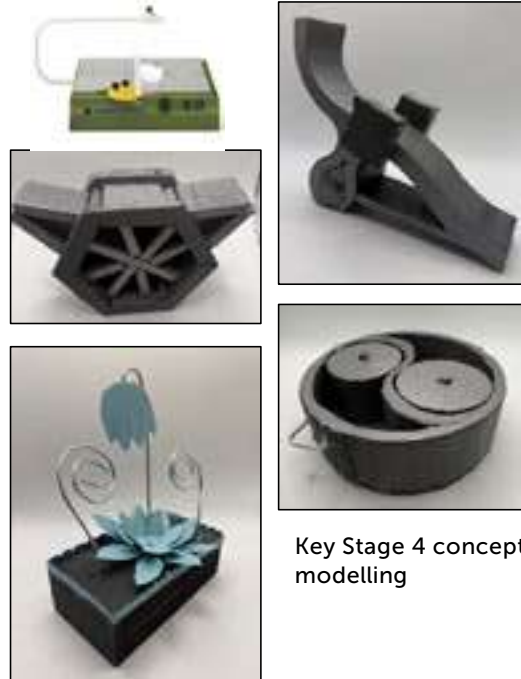
Modelling in both paper and cotton to refine the design.



New Processes & Technologies in Design & Technology.

Foam concept modelling, using the new hot wire cutters, allows students to produce quality prototypes to evaluate and refine prior to production.

This process is embedded across all key stages, and we have found a wonderful supplier for our foam!

We are planning to embed 3D printing software into KS3, KS4 and KS5 teaching from September 2026. Some KS4 students are using it for their coursework already.



Students are encouraged to create a login for one or both of these free software programmes, and to have a go at creating objects.

The thermoforming centre

allows pupils to vacuum form, dome blow as well as general heat forming processes for polymers. Additionally, the centre allows us to teach injection moulding, plastic welding and extrusion processes.

We are looking forward to using this in the forthcoming polymer project in Year 9.



Competitions

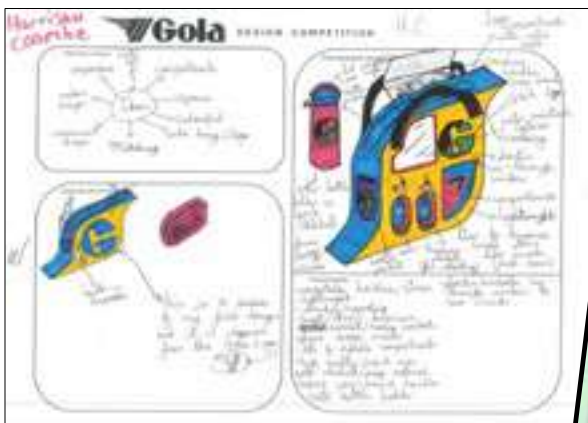
We are always on the look out for live design briefs and competitions. They give pupils a real context for their work, and brand designing allows them to experience the design industry.

Dear Parents and Carers

Vaccination UK is visiting Woldgate School on 2nd March, 2026 and your child in YEAR 9 is due to receive their DTP (Diphtheria, Tetanus, Polio) and MENINGITIS ACWY vaccinations this year.

If your child does not receive their vaccine at the session in school, there will be a further session later in the year and out of school clinics will also be available in the school holidays.

Eight talented Woldgate students travelled to Hornsea School to take part in a fiercely contested schools' darts tournament on January 15th - and they certainly left their mark!

East Riding and Humberside Cross Country Event

On Tuesday 20th January, pupils from our school competed in the East Riding and Humberside Cross Country event held at Central Park, Scunthorpe. The competition was open to pupils who had qualified through the East Riding event before Christmas, and around 150 pupils from across the district took part in each race.

Our Year 10/11 boys were represented by Jack D, Jenson H, Will E and Noah S, who each competed over 5,060 metres.

The Year 10/11 girls' team were represented by Eva B, Cianna A, Talia N, Beatrice Q and Ellie S, each racing over 3,990 metres.

Competing for the Year 7 girls were India M, Martha R, Annabelle M, Florence T, Heidi W and Abigail W, while Teddy R represented the Year 7 boys. They all ran over 2,900 metres.

Fergus B and Sidney B competed for the Year 8/9 boys over the 3,540 metre distance.

All pupils competed in very cold and windy conditions but showed great determination and resilience throughout. Every student represented the school extremely well, with notable performances from Eva and Jack, both of whom secured impressive top 30 finishes in highly competitive fields. Congratulations to them both.

The standout performance of the day came from Fergus Baigrie, who overcame far from ideal preparation before his race. Unknown to us and Fergus, a change in schedule meant his race took place earlier than expected, leaving him scrambling to put



on his running spikes. Managing to get them on in the nick of time, he found himself at the back of his starting pen. At the start of the race, Fergus made a bold move up the inside of the first straight and bend, placing himself into first position within the opening 400 metres. He maintained this lead for the remainder of the race, (despite his best efforts not to, by briefly going the wrong way and forfeiting around 60 metres to his nearest pursuer in second place!) Fergus's outstanding performance means he will qualify for a regional event in the coming months which is incredible.

A final congratulations to all pupils involved. They performed admirably, demonstrated excellent sportsmanship throughout the day, and conducted themselves perfectly, making the school extremely proud.

Information for Parents: Exam Access Arrangements

What are Access Arrangements?

Access Arrangements are adjustments made for pupils and students who have a long term disability, learning difficulty, medical need, or temporary injury that affects their ability to access assessments. They ensure pupils can demonstrate their knowledge and skills without being unfairly disadvantaged. They do **not** change the demands of the exam.

Examples include:

- Extra time
- A reader or computer reader
- Use of a word processor
- Rest breaks
- Modified papers (e.g., large print)

Why might a pupil receive Access Arrangements?

A pupil may qualify if they have a:

- Specific learning difficulty (e.g., dyslexia)
- Physical or sensory need
- Medical or mental health condition
- Developmental need affecting processing or working speed

Schools must gather evidence that these needs are **long-term** and represent the pupil's **normal way of working**.

How are Access Arrangements decided?

1. Assessment of need

This may include testing by a qualified assessor or reviewing medical/professional evidence.

2. School evidence

Teachers must show that the arrangement reflects how the pupil usually works in class.

3. JCQ application

For GCSEs and A levels, schools submit applications to JCQ (Joint Council for Qualifications) for approval.

What Access Arrangements are not

- They are **not** automatic, even if a pupil had them in primary school.
- They **do not guarantee higher grades**.
- They **cannot** be granted last-minute without evidence.

What evidence might be needed?

Depending on the arrangement, the school may request:

- Medical letters or reports
- EHCP or SEN reports
- Assessment scores (e.g., processing or reading speed)
- Classroom examples of difficulty

All evidence must meet JCQ requirements.

How can parents



support the process?

- Share any relevant reports or medical evidence with the school.
- Encourage your child to consistently use their arrangement in lessons or internal tests so it becomes part of their normal way of working.
- Contact the school if your child's needs change.
